5th December 2016

It was another good week, results wise, with both our U16 girls and Senior Scholars recording narrow wins.

Our U16 girls avenged an early season league defeat to Cobh by coming out on top in their Cork Cup encounter. The girls started brightly with their defence, led by Siofra Gleeson and Amy Higgins blunting the Cobh offence. The girls opened up a 8-2 lead and looked comfortable. The first half was a cagey affair with both teams cancelling each other out in a low scoring affair. Tornadoes held a slight 13-12 interval lead. The game opened up in the second half, which suited the Scholars. They were able to up the pace of the game which forced their taller opponents into rushed offences. The scholars transition play began to pay dividends and they ran out deserving 35-32 winners.
